Additionally, given the fact that boilers are the heart of a process: If they fail, thousands, if not tens of thousands of dollars can be wasted in product loss or extended downtime.

Remember, too, that boilers are a key safety concern. If compromised, they can cause substantial harm to life, limb and property, thereby driving capital and insurance costs to the extreme, to say nothing about the physical and emotional human impacts that responsible businesses strive to avoid.

On top of all this, as the cost of fuel continues to escalate, your already high fixed and variable

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boiler-system operating costs are growing. Note, however, that you can substantially reduce such costs (by as much as 15-20% on average)—*that is, if there is the knowledge and desire to implement necessary change(s)*.

Where does that type of knowledge and desire come from?
